




Murphy the Donkey and accompanying elf, Helen, did much to entertain the children whilst waiting for their 'big moment'!



## Winter Warming Curry

An easy chicken curry if you buy in the spice paste already mixed (*there's nothing wrong with cheating*)....with a recipe for the foodies who want to make it "to taste" below.

#### Ingredients

#### Method

STEP 1

#### 2 tbsp sunflower oil

1 onion, thinly sliced

2 garlic cloves, crushed

thumb-sized piece of ginger, grated

6 chicken thighs, boneless and skinless

3 tbsp medium spice paste (tikka works well)

400g can chopped tomatoes

100g Greek yogurt

1 small bunch of coriander, leaves chopped

50g ground almonds

naan breads or cooked basmati rice, to serve

#### INGREDIENTS

- 2 tablespoons coriander seeds
- 2 tablespoons cumin seeds
- 1 tablespoon fennel seeds
- 1 teaspoon black peppercorns
- 2 dried red chilies
- 1 shallot, peeled and chopped
- 4 garlic cloves, peeled
- 4" fresh ginger
- 1 teaspoon ground turmeric (turmeric powder)
- 1 teaspoon paprika
- 1 teaspoon red chili powder (add more if you like)
- 1 tablespoon tomato paste (tomato purée)
- 2 teaspoons white vinegar
- 1 teaspoon salt



Heat the oil in a flameproof casserole dish or large frying pan over a medium heat. Add the onion and a generous pinch of salt and fry for 8-10 mins, or until the onion has turned golden brown and sticky. Add the garlic and ginger, cooking for a further minute.

#### STEP 2

Chop the chicken into chunky 3cm pieces, add to the pan and fry for 5 mins before stirring through the spice paste and tomatoes, along with 250ml water. Bring to the boil, lower to a simmer and cook on a gentle heat uncovered for 25-30 mins or until rich and slightly reduced. Stir though the yogurt, coriander and ground almonds, season and serve with warm naan or fluffy basmati rice.  Place coriander seeds, cumin seeds, fennel seeds, dried red chilies and peppercorns in a frying pan over low heat. Cook, stirring constantly, for about 2-3 minutes or until the seeds turn golden and aromatic. Remove from heat.

Total Time

15 minutes

- 2. Allow to cool completely. Transfer cooked spices to a food processor. Grind to a fine powder.
- Add shallots, ginger, garlic, ground turmeric, paprika, red chili powder, tomato paste, vinegar and salt. Grind again to make a smooth paste.
- Use immediately, or store the paste in a sterilized jar for up to a week.

## 'MALPAS MISCELLANIES' - David Hayns

Malpas local historian David Hayns has re-issued his two 'Malpas Miscellanies', generously illustrated 36 page booklets. The first is 'A MALPAS MISCELLANY', a collection of articles and poems about Malpas and the surrounding area. One article is about the two Rectors, who formerly served the parish, and their links with the 'King's Chair' which stands in the 'Lion at Malpas', including the full text of a long poem by a 19<sup>th</sup> century rector, claiming to recount the legend behind the Chair. Other articles tell of the town's links with the Romans, including the Malpas Tabula, a military 'pension certificate', which is now on display in the British Museum; the story of the Malpas Fire Service, from when the parish purchased its first two fire engines in 1832; Malpas churches and chapels; the Women's Institute on the 'Home Front' during the second World War; music and drama in the town during the 1940s and 1950s; windmills which have vanished from the area; the visit of Celia Fiennes to No Mans Heath in 1698; the Clayhole in Wrexham Road; local members of the Cheshire Yeomanry who became involved in a 'punch-up' at Aldershot when training for the Boer War campaign; and the provision of lower cost housing in the town.

'A SECOND MALPAS MISCELLANY', comprises a further collection of eleven writings about the area. They include a main article about the fairs and weekly markets which, until the 19<sup>th</sup> century, were a regular part of life in this agricultural community. Another chronicles the 17<sup>th</sup> century Civil Wars activities, including the Battle of Oldcastle, and how one of the outcomes was the founding, in the following century, of Richard Alport's charity school, the forerunner of today's primary school. A somewhat mysterious local character was Richard Minshull of Malpas Old Hall who had links with Bonnie Prince Charlie, the 1745 Jacobite Rebellion and the semi-secret society known as 'The Cycle of the White Rose'. Saint Oswald's church has three articles that tell the story of the church's 19<sup>th</sup> century orchestra, complete with the instrument known as a Serpent; investigate some of the persons who were buried actually under the church floor, rather than in the churchyard; and explain how the Churchwardens were responsible for vermin control in the parish! A local newspaper report from 1881 led to The Empress and Sir Watkin, about a visit to Malpas, in order to hunt with the Wynnstay, of Elizabeth, Empress of Austria. Some of the author's research into local place-names is presented in 'Tons, 'leys' and townships: The beginnings of our parish and Why 'Gallantry' Bank?. Of the two remaining articles, one tells the story of the town's water supply, the other reprints a 1901 poem about a Malpas ladies' hockey team who became rather 'too big for their boots'!

## 617 (Heber) Air Cadet Corps

It's a busy schedule of activities for the Air Cadets as I learnt when I went to visit 617 (Heber) Air Cadet Corps in mid December last year.

The Air Cadets were just in the middle of a quiz night when I arrived and as I left they were taking a break with drinks and Jaffa Cakes. I enjoyed meeting such a friendly group (listed below, asterixes denote new promotions) and they told me a lot about the activities they do. I was struck by how valua-

ble the skills were that the cadets were learning, both for a future potential RAF career, but also as general life skills.

Air Cadets take a range of courses planned over the year, building up their knowledge of some really interesting specialist subjects and in practical skills. Whether it's training and education, parade and drill or team-work and problems-solving the cadets were clear that all activities are fun, and build strong friendships. Drill requires real self-discipline and is great training in personal organisation, ability to work in

All the cadets had basic first aid training and knew how to carry out CPR which they had practiced.

They had recently had a great challenge night (see pictures) which included 3 teams that competed to design and build a vehicle from a range of equipment specially brought in for the evening, which they then raced. It was a real high pressure test with a time limit so all of the team members needed to play their part to achieve a successful outcome in time. It had clearly also brought out a great competitive spirit! The activity was organised by the RAF careers team who visited to also give them information about future career options. With the RAF requiring such a wide range of skills there are opportunities for everyone.



The many fascinating topics they have studied include **Space Technology**. They found out about how that is translated into wider use (box below). We chatted about what counts as space (currently defined as the Karman Line, about 100km (60 miles) above mean sea level), the need for satellites and the challenges of space debris. I was certainly impressed!

All the cadets get the chance to train on the flight simulator they showed me and once the cadets are over 14 they can apply for a flight with the RAF. I was surprised to learn that this is a 1-1

flight in a Grobtutor plane as the co-pilot with an RAF pilot. Five of the group I met had flown from Cosford and one unfortunately missed out in 2020 due to lockdown happening on his appointment weekend.

The RAF organises a number of cadet camps throughout the year where they can join with other cadet corps, building wider friendships across the country and with-

in the force. It all sounds like a really fun group to be involved with.

I had the chance to congratulate the newly promoted corporals and tell them to keep us all informed about their news in 2022.

Did you know that memory foam was originally developed to line astronaut seats to reduce the Gforces they experience? And commonly seen foil blankets came from thermal insulation in the space station?

## High Flight – John Gillespie Magee

Oh, I have slipped the surly bonds of Earth And danced the skies on laughter-silvered wings; Sunward I've climbed, and joined the tumbling mirth Of sun-split clouds – and done a hundred things You have not dreamed of – wheeled and soared and swung High in the sunlit silence; hov'ring there, I've chased the shouting wind along, and flung My eager craft through footless halls of air.

Up, up the long, delirious, burning blue I've topped the wind-swept heights with easy grace. Where never lark, or even eagle flew – And, while with silent, lifting mind I've trod The high untrespassed sanctity of space, Put out my hand, and touched the face of God.

High Flight' was written in 1941 by John Gillespie Magee, shortly before he died aged 19. It is the official poem of both the RAF and the RCAF (Royal Canadian Air Force). This poem is inscribed in full on the space shuttle challenger memorial at Arlington Ceremony in the USA, and was also taken into space on an index card by Michael Collins (who famously did not walk on the moon but instead controlled the Apollo 11 whilst his colleagues Buzz Aldrin and Neil Armstrong took that "giant leap"). The poem is a moving depiction of what it is like to leave the earth and one's everyday life behind and fly.

### St. Valentine....from Vatican News

The Roman priest The story of Valentine, the Roman priest, dates back to around AD270, during the persecutions of the Emperor Claudius Gothicus. Valentine was well known for his sanctity and the Emperor, who was intrigued by his fame, invited him to the palace. He offered Valentine his friendship and said he should adore the gods. But Valentino stated courageously and firmly that it was a waste of time worshipping the gods since Jesus Christ had brought the only true hope and the promise of a better world. The Emperor entrusted him to a Roman nobleman named Asterius, whom he ordered to convert Valentine using "mellifluous arguments" (*Ed: try that on the teenagers*). Asterius had a daughter who had been blind since the age of two. Valentino prayed over her and the girl regained her sight. Faced




with this miracle, Asterius converted to Christianity along with his whole family. When he heard about their conversion, the Emperor Claudius condemned Valentine to be beheaded. The execution took place on the Via Flaminia in Rome. He was buried nearby and a church was built there in his honour.

The Bishop of Terni The story regarding the Bishop of Terni takes place about seventy years later: Valentine was invited to Rome by the rhetorician and philosopher Crato, a teacher of Greek and Latin. He had a son who suffered from a physical deformity. No doctor had managed to heal him. Crato promised Valentine half of his possessions if he healed his son. But during a long night-time conversation, Valentine explained that it would not be his useless wealth that would heal the boy, but his faith in the one true God. Valentine then prayed over the boy and he regained his health. Moved by this miracle, Crato and his whole family were baptized by the bishop, together with the son of the Prefect of Rome (Placidus). Placidus held office between 346-347AD, so this is the historical date associated with Valentine's martyrdom. Placidus was devastated by the conversion of his son so he had Valentine arrested and decapitated on the Via Flaminia in Rome.

Patron saint of lovers There are too many connections between the stories of the Valentine of Rome and the Valentine of Terni, including their places of martyrdom and burial, for us not to think they are one and the same person. Both give heroic testimonies of faith, both perform a miraculous healing that causes conversions, and both are martyred by beheading on the Via Flaminia in Rome. It was the Benedictine Order that maintained the church of St Valentine in Terni during the Middle Ages and that spread the cult of Valentine's Day in their monasteries in France and England.

The tradition of his being patron saint of lovers finds its origin in an ancient English text by Geoffrey Chaucer, according to whom birds start mating on Valentine's Day. So Saint Valentine has also become the saint who announces the coming spring – which is why he is sometimes represented holding the sun in his hand and the link to lovers increased by the fact that his Saint's day, Feb 14th, coincided with the date of the Roman fertility festival of the goddess Juno.

#### Winter Gardening Tips From Malpas Amateur Gardeners

A Happy New Year to you all. You may have been given a houseplant for Xmas, so here are a few tips to keeping them looking good. Firstly all plants need as much light as you can give them at this time of year as light levels are so low, secondly only water them once the compost feels dry to the touch, preferably watering them from below with tepid rain water if you have it, keeping the foliage and flowers dry, do not mist flowering plants , as this encourages grey mould on the petals. Indoor azaleas (remember these are not hardy, so don't put them in the garden!) are an exception to these rules as they must be kept moist and always use rain water for them. Poinsettias particularly hate draughts or hot radiators, so try to find a spot where the temperature is fairly even, kitchens can be good. Don't beat your self up if they eventually die, they are still always better value than cut flowers and a house in winter is a tricky environment with its fluctuating temperatures.

In the garden there is plenty to do, if the weather allows. Now is the time to prune wisteria, last year's whippy growth should be pruned back to two buds, do not remove entirely! This small piece of stem known as a spur is where your flowers will form. Apple and pear trees can be lightly pruned, do not prune heavily to reduce the size of a tree as you will only stimulate a rash of vigorous upright growth, which will crowd out the branches and take years to fruit. Simply remove any dead, diseased or damaged wood, then any crossing branches or very upright inward growing branches, aiming to open up the centre of the tree, letting in air and light. Do not prune plums in winter as you leave them open to silver leaf disease, wait until summer if it is needed.

Weed borders before the bulbs start to peep through and mulch any bare ground with leaf mould or garden compost. Perennials can be lifted and split discarding the old centre of the plant. Take time to enjoy any winter flowering plants such as Hamamelis, Mahonias and Sarcococca, my garden was alive with bees at the weekend as the mild weather woke them up and they came looking for food. If you don't have any winter interest maybe now is a good time to visit a winter garden such as Dorothy Clive to get some ideas to brighten yours up, after all winter is just as long a season as summer.

On February 10<sup>th</sup> Malpas Amateur Gardeners has its first speaker of the year, Jill Rawlings from Mynd Hardy Plants who will take us on a tour of Italian gardens, how lovely when we are not able to go for real. You can also rejoin the club and collect your new membership card. As usual we meet in the Methodist Church at 7.30. We are a friendly group and follow all government guidelines to keep you safe.


